MESSAGE ABOUT ORTHODOX CHRISTIAN UNITY

Hi Everyone, My name is Bill Souvall and I'm the president of Orthodox Christian Laity (OCL). OCL has a 23 year history of actively promoting and supporting Orthodox unity on this continent. We are encouraged by the recent Episcopal Assembly, and supported that effort by donating \$20,000 toward the conference cost. For the first time there is a chance that the Old World will finally allow the American Church to begin to construct a plan for unity. This can only be done by the bishops – here in this country – which is why we have sought to promote unity for 23 years, defined as “locally elected bishops, sitting in synod.” This is the ancient tradition of the Church.

OCL also believes that the tradition of the church is for the hierarchs, clergy and laity to work in symphony for the glory of Christ. This is another ancient tradition of the Church, not some Protestant invention. You may or may not know that laity participated in the Ecumenical Councils.

As we begin a new Ecclesiastical Year (September 1, 2010), it is time for you to become part of the unity process! OCL is encouraging clergy and laity across the country to learn all you can about what is going on. The bishops need our help to organize this unified church in the U.S. Much of the talent which will be needed, legal, accounting, strategic planning, organizational – can ONLY come from us, the laity.

To this end, I would encourage you to do three things:

1. Become familiar with the primary sources of information establishing the Episcopal Assemblies which begins with the Statement signed by all the Autocephalous Old World leaders in Oct 2008 - through the MESSAGE signed by all the Bishops of North and Central America attending the assembly held in NYC in May 2010. All documents are posted on OCL website www.ocl.org. Keep up with the latest developments through the web.
2. Encourage our clergy to host pan-Orthodox gatherings and liturgical celebrations throughout the Ecclesiastical Year. We should be celebrating our multi-cultural Orthodox Christian heritage as only we can because of our American experience. The major feast days such as the Nativity of the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary and the Exaltation of the Holy Cross which open the Ecclesiastical Year along with all the other feasts should include local pan-Orthodox Vespers. We should be encouraging local clergy associations to meet with the Orthodox Bishops in their local areas and discuss the future of the Church. Encourage your local Clergy Association to host meetings with the laity to discuss building a unified Church in America.
3. We invite laity in local areas to host informal gatherings in their homes, through their club affiliations such as seniors, brotherhoods and sisterhoods to discuss what it means to be a local Church. What does bringing our resources together (i.e. bishops, publishing, schools, camps) mean for us? Will a unified Church be autonomous (head is selected abroad) or autocephalous (head is selected here). We are all encouraged by our Church leaders to think “out of the box” on these issues.



EISODIKON

Come, let us worship and bow down before Christ, O Son of God, who art risen from the dead, save us who sing unto thee, Alleluia. Alleluia. Alleluia.

TROPARION OF THE RESURRECTION (TONE 4)

Having learned the joyful message of the Resurrection from the angel, the women Disciples cast from them their parental condemnation, and proudly broke the news to the Disciples, saying, Death hath been spoiled. Christ God is risen, granting the world Great Mercy.

TROPARION OF THE DORMITION (TONE 1)

In giving birth, O Theotokos, thou hast retained thy virginity, and in falling asleep thou hast not forsaken the world. for thou wast translated into life, being the Mother of Life. Wherefore by thine intercessions, deliver our souls from death.

TROPARION OF SAINT GEORGE, PATRON OF OUR COMMUNITY (TONE 4)

As deliverer of captives, and defender of the poor, healer of the infirm, champion of kings, victorious Great-Martyr George, intercede with Christ our God, for our souls' salvation.

KONTAKON OF THE DORMITION (TONE 2)

Verily, the Theotokos, who is ever watchful in intercessions, who is never rejected, neither tomb nor death could control. But being the Mother of Life, he who dwelth in her ever-virgin womb did translate her to life.

EPISTLE AND GOSPEL

Prokeimenon and Verse: O Lord, how magnificent are your works. Thou hast made all things in wisdom. Bless the Lord, O my soul.

The Reading is from Apostle Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians (16:13-24, for the 13th Sunday)

Brethren, be watchful, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love. Now, brethren, you know that the household of Steph'anas were the first converts in Acha'ia, and they have devoted themselves to the service of the saints; I urge you to be subject to such men and to every fellow worker and laborer. I rejoice at the coming of Steph'anas and Fortuna'tus and Acha'icus, because they have made up for your absence; for they refreshed my spirit as well as yours. Give recognition to such men. The churches of Asia send greetings. Aq'uila and Prisca, together with the church in their house, send you hearty greetings in the Lord. All the brethren send greetings. Greet one another with a holy kiss. I, Paul, write this greeting with my own hand. If any one has no love for the Lord, let him be accursed. Our Lord, come! The grace of the Lord Jesus be with you. My love be with you all in Christ Jesus. Amen.

Alleluia. Bend Thy bow, and proceed prosperously and be king, because of truth and meekness and righteousness. *Alleluia.* Thou hast loved righteousness and hated iniquity. Wherefore God, Thy God, hath anointed Thee with the oil of gladness more than Thy fellows. *Alleluia.*

The Reading is from the Holy Gospel according to Saint Matthew

(21:33-42 for the 13th Sunday)

Jesus said, "Hear another parable. There was a householder who planted a vineyard, and set a hedge around it, and dug a wine press in it, and built a tower, and let it out to tenants, and went into another country. When the season of fruit drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants, to get his fruit; and the tenants took his servants and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other servants, more than the first; and they did the same to them. Afterward he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and have his inheritance.' And they took him and cast him out of the vineyard, and killed him. When therefore the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and let out the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the fruits in their seasons." Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The very stone which the builders rejected has become the head of the corner; this was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes'?"
