### PARISH LIFE CONFERENCE REVIEW:

The 70th annual Diocese of Worcester & New England PLC took place two weekends ago in Providence, RI, and Norwood was well represented. The conference was presided over by His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP and was attended by clergy and people from the ten parishes and missions.

Among the highlights: Our Ladies President, **Katie Birtwell** led a delegation at the meeting of the Antiochian Women; we also had representatives at the Fellowship meeting (more than most other parishes!) At the Teen SOYO meeting, **Jenna Weiskerger** was elected diocesan treasurer. The Bible Bowl was awesome, the closest competition in years; our teen team of **Timothy Markatos, Jen Byron** and **Jenna** tied for first place (then in overtime, the Pawtucket church won by a single point.) The adult team was **Kathy Kalliel** and **Judith Howard** and the leader for both teams was **Emily Shay**.

Saturday brought the Church School Awards breakfast, many of you had a sneak peak at the wonderful *Wedding at Cana 3-D icon* designed and produced by our students, it was really cool. **Rich Plouffe** introduced our students to His Eminence. After the meal was the Choir Festival, and you won't be surprised to hear that our singers were awesome. That evening the Parish Council / Order of Saint Ignatius Dinner was held and eleven folks from our church were there, including **Hellas Assad** who was inducted into the Order. The Conference concluded with Hierarchical Liturgy, at which many of our members attended, served at the altar and sang in the choir (led by **David Franciosi**.) ### ENTERING THE CHURCH LATE

"The time to arrive at church is before the service starts, but for some unknown reason, it has become the custom - or rather the bad habit - for some to come to church late. If you arrive after the Divine Liturgy begins, try to enter the church quietly - and observe what is happening. If the Epistle or Gospel is being read or the Little or Great Entrance is taking place, wait until it is finished to quickly find a seat. If Father is giving the sermon, stay in the back until he has concluded. If in doubt, check with one of the ushers to see if it is a good time to seat yourself. Try not to interrupt the Liturgy with your entrance. By the way, the best way to avoid this problem is to arrive on time - then you don't have to wonder if it's okay to come in or not. People who come late to the Liturgy should not partake of the Eucharist!"

## IOCC's Frontline Clergy on the Ground in Iowa

Residents of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, spend their days piling debris outside their ruined homes. One woman who lost everything only cared about not finding her favorite picture of her daughter. "This is a vibrant community, which has been changed forever. People try to go about their daily lives and they can't deal with a lot of what's hitting them emotionally right now," says Father Chris Flesoras, a member of International Orthodox Christian Charities' (IOCC) Emergency Response Network, known as the "Orthodox Frontline," which is providing trauma counseling and coordinating resources with other charities on the scene.

Also, learn about the first response team from IOCC to the flood ravaged areas via this Ancient Faith Radio podcast with Fr. Haralambos (Bob) Fox, who is on assignment in Cedar Rapids, IA.

IOCC's US Program dispatched the Frontline team to Iowa after a week of torrential rains caused the worst flooding to hit the Midwest in 15 years. Twenty-four people perished and more than 40,000 had to evacuate their homes in what may be the largest disaster since Katrina.

This Frontline team, which includes Orthodox clergy from California and Georgia, arrived in Des Moines and quickly went to work building a network of contacts and resources within the Orthodox community, Catholic charities, and local hospitals.

Father Vasile Bitere, an IOCC Frontliner from Holy Trinity Orthodox Church in Augusta, Georgia, says that while "Des Moines residents were overwhelmed by the damage, what affected them more was the stress of repeating history. In 1993 the city was devastated by massive flooding."

In Cedar Rapids, the team met with the Orthodox community including clergy and parishioners from St. John the Baptist and St. George, and then on to the St. Raphael mission in Iowa City. While the churches did not sustain damage, some parishioners lost homes and possessions.

The IOCC team organized a pan Orthodox service of supplication to the Theotokos and performed stress management debriefings. "We offered them our ministry of presence," says Father Chris, who is pastor of St. Anna Orthodox Church in Roseville, California. "And we worked to link people with the resources we had gathered from different charities." Some of the help offered was as basic as filling out FEMA disaster claims and informing the survivors of other assistance options.

IOCC is also providing cash grants to Orthodox parishioners who have sustained damage and, and is partnering with Catholic Charities to reach out to the community at large. The Frontline team will make their final report to IOCC senior executives, who will then determine resources available for future assistance.

"This is going to be a long recovery process," says Frontliner Father Bob Fox, of St. Nicholas Church in Northridge, California, "and people will experience a crisis of faith along with the day to day hardship of trying to recover homes and businesses."

**The Reading is from Apostle Paul's Letter to Titus**

*(3:8-15, for the Fathers)*

The saying is sure. I desire you to insist on these things, so that those who have believed in God may be careful to apply themselves to good deeds; these are excellent and profitable to men. But avoid stupid controversies, genealogies, dissensions, and quarrels over the law, for they are unprofitable and futile. As for a man who is factious, after admonishing him once or twice, have nothing more to do with him, knowing that such a person is perverted and sinful; he is self-condemned. When I send Artemas or Tychicus to you, do your best to come to me at Nicopolis, for I have decided to spend the winter there. Do your best to speed Zenas the lawyer and Apollos on their way; see that they lack nothing. And let our people learn to apply themselves to good deeds, so as to help cases of urgent need, and not to be unfruitful. All who are with me send greetings to you. Greet those who love us in the faith. Grace be with you all.
